THE NAME OF MELBOURNE.

Melbourne, Florida, the winter home of the Florida East Coast Chautauqua, was named after delightful Melbourne, the capital of the British colony of Victoria in S. E. Australia, on the Yarra Yarra, 8 miles from its mouth at the head of Port Phillip founded in 1837. Melbourne was named when Lord Melbourne was Prime Minister and Queen Victoria had just ascended the throne. Lord Melbourne took his title from Melbourne, an English village in Derbyshire called in Domesday Book Milburn, the Mill—burn, where as Domesday records there was a mill of the annual value of three shillings.

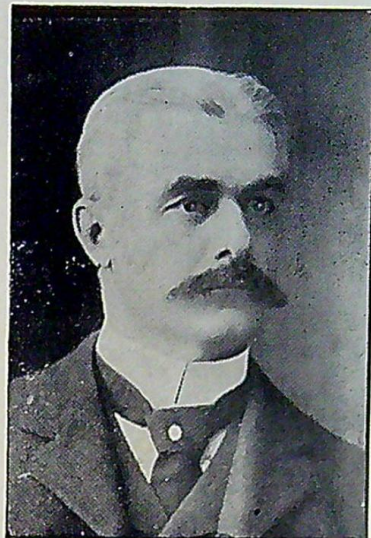




The Mother Chautauqua.

In south western New York there is an incorporated town of 165 acres extent which exercises an unconscious educational influence over a large part of the United States. Chautauqua of today is developed from a bible study assembled by Lewis Miller in 1874 at Fairport, and broadened in idea and purpose by Dr. J. H. Vincent. The Chautauqua idea is universal education, a stimulus for ambition to know, to do, to think, to read and to talk, and to be able to say something when you do talk.

Lake Chautauqua lies 70 miles South of Buffalo, New York, and its shore is lined with cottages in the woods, where gathers every Summer 60,000 vacation students from all classes and grades of labor, science, and art, to broaden and expand their comprehensions of life and its duties.



WM T WELLS

President William T. Wells has been identified more closely than any other local member of the Chautauqua force in promoting its permanent welfare. He came to Florida for his health, bringing with him a business education and technical experience so necessary in a pioneer who plans and does things. He was born in Brooklyn, New York, and was educated at public schools, the Brooklyn Polytechnic and Columbia University, and after practical field work as surveyor and varied Wall Street experience he became connected with large iron foundries, and later developed and patented the most successful method of oxidizing iron to prevent rust—a process in extensive use. He became the second President of the Melbourne Chautauqua built the large beautiful Auditorium and remains by public demand its present efficient and active presiding officer.

DR. LEON A. PEEK who would not hold still long enough to have his picture taken, is our own and only local physician and Vice-President of the East Coast Chautauqua Association.

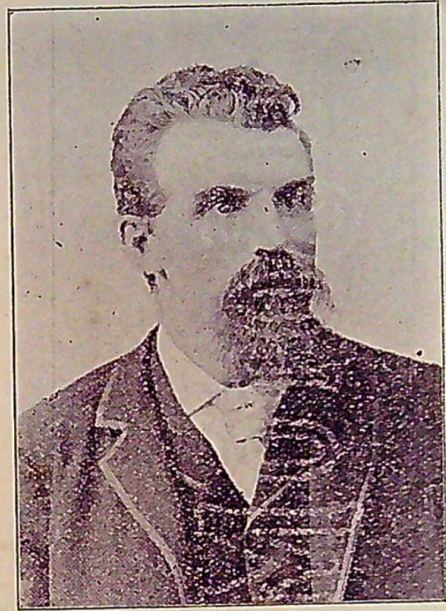
BANKER A B TAYLOR,

H. W. I. METCALF.

Of West Palm Beach is known from Jacksonville to Miami as a prominent lawyer. He is County Commissioner of Dade County, ex Mayor of West Palm Beach and the principal Underwriter and Real Estate operator of his Florida home city. He was born an Englishman in 1844, an emigrant to America in 1854, an operator in the Pennsylvania oil region in 1864 and a lawyer in 1874. From his boyhood in Wisconsin through his coal and iron experiences in Ohio and Pennsylvania and his large legal practice in Ohio and Florida, he has been an annual visitor at the MOTHER CHAUTAUQUA since its organization and has been a faithful worker in the East Coast Assembly.

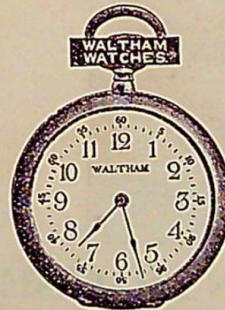

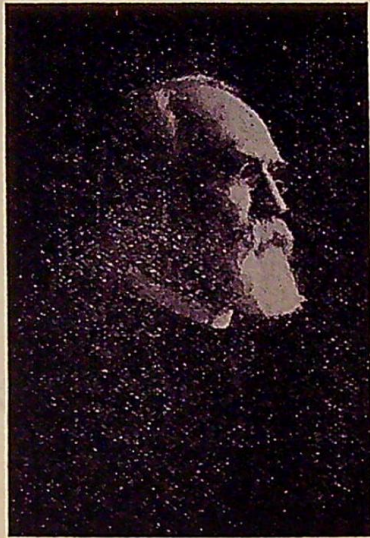

PROF R E MIMS

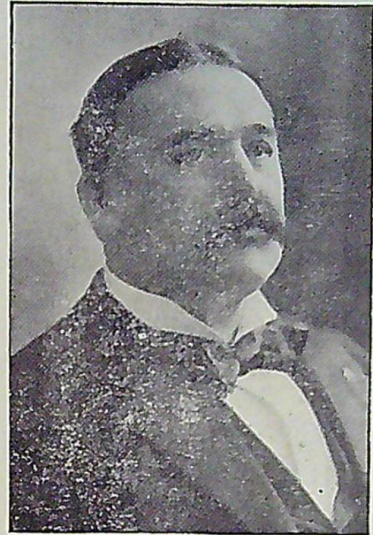

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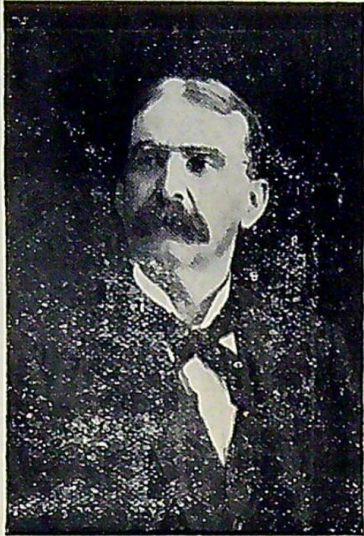
E P SIMPSON

Highest and Healthiest Point on Indian River.

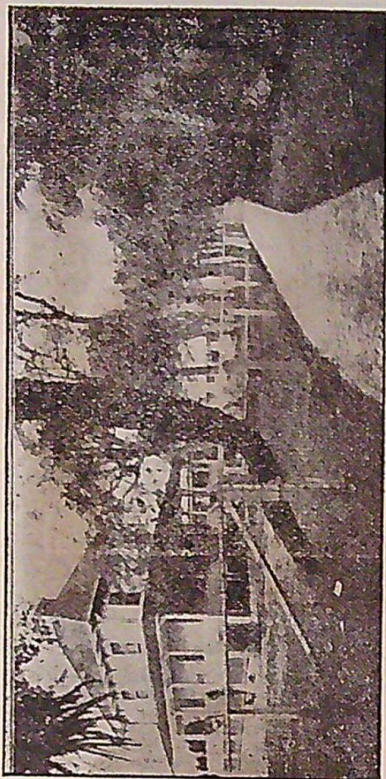
